ANNOUNCEMENTS & COMMUNICATIONS

Supervisor Barrett thanked 3N Document Destruction for another successful Spring shredding day that was held yesterday. 3N Document donates their services for the day. 1,500 lbs. of donated perishables were collected from the residents who participated in the free service and will be given to the Jonesville Food Pantry. Thank you to the CERT volunteers for their help with traffic control. The supervisor announced another shredding day will be held in the Fall.

Councilwoman Reid announced the Arbor Day celebration event was held at Town Hall yesterday. A sugar maple tree was planted by a junior Tree Committee member and Girl Scout. Many residents attended and was very successful.

Councilman O'Hara announced, in the month of May, the Town will be celebrating Historic Preservation month by kicking off the month tonight with several recognitions for their efforts in Town. He announced Sunday, May 21 at 1pm at the Grooms Tavern, Sue Thompson, an amateur archeologist, will be speaking with refreshments to follow. An Art display of historical people and places will be exhibited throughout Town in observance of Historic Preservation month.

Supervisor Barrett stated, a series of initiatives will be announced during the month recognizing residents working hard to preserve the history of the Town of Clifton Park. He explained the same will be happening at the County level as well. He stated there is a new logo for the 250th anniversary of the Battle of Saratoga, the turning point of the American Revolution. Merchandise with the logo will be available for the public to purchase. The County will be spending the next few years planning for the event.

PRESENTATION-Dr. Oliver Robinson, Shenendehowa Central School District Superintendent

Dr. Robinson gave an overview of the upcoming 2023-2324 School Budget. He announced the budget vote will be on May 16, 2023, 7am to 9pm at the Gowana Middle School Gym. Dr. Robinson distributed the upcoming newsletter explaining what's on the ballot. He explained there are four propositions on the ballot. Proposition- There will be two seats on the seven-member Board of Education up for election, each seat carries a three-year term. The incumbents are Naomi Hoffman and Gusta Miller, the incumbents are running unopposed. Proposition -Bus electrification. NYS passed a law that by the year 2027 the school can only purchase electric buses. A lot of factors are at play for the feasibility of accomplishing that. By 2035 the school is supposed to have all electric buses. The school district has 217 buses. This current proposition is to purchase four electric buses, one level three charger, and five standard buses to replace the aging buses. He stated the typical 66 passenger bus costs approximately \$160,000, whereas one electric bus will cost approximately over a half-million dollars. The school district is taking a very measured approach to the turnover of the buses. Proposition -the Capital Project to renovate 5 Maxwell Drive facility into an Early Learning Center, using \$3 million dollars in reserve funds, a 30-year bonding spread for the smoothing of debt, and approximately \$25 million in State Building Aid. It is estimated that the tax impact of this project will be approximately twenty-five cents per thousand of tax assessed value, per year. He explained this space/building will free up classrooms in the other buildings for future growth. Proposition – the \$206,611,477 budget itself includes a spending increase of 6.31%. He explained for a resident in this school district the tax rate ten years ago was \$30.61 per \$1,000, the proposed tax rate will be \$31.96 per \$1,000, a \$.23 difference. Next year will have a decent bump up in State Aide. All previous Federal Funds given because of the pandemic will end in 2024. He stated Shenendehowa has a balance of income wealth and property wealth.

Supervisor Barrett questioned if Federal grants will be offered to offset the cost of the electric buses mandate.

Dr. Robinson answered, NYSEDA will be offering grants for the electric bus mandates and the school is already in the process of applying.

PRESENTATION-2023 Historic Preservation Award

Town Clerk Brobston read the following Resolution.

Resolution No. 102 of 2023, a resolution honoring Chris Nafis for his leadership and contributions to restoring and preserving the Amity Church Cemetery in Vischer Ferry and his selection as the recipient of the Clifton Park Historic Preservation Award for 2022.

Introduced by Supervisor Barrett, who moved its adoption, seconded by the entire Town Board.

WHEREAS, Chris Nafis organized and led a group of volunteers to accomplish numerous restorative tasks, including clearing of brush, cleaning and re-setting of headstones, and excavation and recovery of headstones that were lying flat and partially covered with earth, and

WHEREAS, Chris Nafis extensively researched historical records and applied new technology in the form of drones and ground penetrating devices to accurately map the cemetery, and

WHEREAS, Chris Nafis compiled photographs of gravestones and posted them for the public on the “Find A Grave” web site, along with genealogical information about the families that now lie in the cemetery, and

WHEREAS, Chris Nafis also researched, identified and marked veterans’ graves in the cemetery so that they may be appropriately recognized, and

WHEREAS, Chris Nafis has enriched our community by working to restore and preserve one of Clifton Park’s oldest cemeteries and its associated public records for all to utilize; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the Town Board of Clifton Park thanks Chris Nafis for his extensive volunteer efforts to help our community and congratulates him on his selection as the winner of the Clifton Park Historical Preservation Award for 2022.

Resolution No. 103 of 2023, a resolution honoring Roger Des Forges, a direct descendant of Clifton Park’s first settler, for his generous donation of a historic marker to commemorate the legacy of Ryckert Claes Van Vranken and his family’s long history in the Town of Clifton Park.

Introduced by Supervisor Barrett, who moved its adoption, seconded by the entire Town Board.

WHEREAS, Ryckert Claes Van Vranken, born in 1635 and died in 1713, is recognized by the Town of Clifton Park as its first settler, and

WHEREAS, the Van Vranken Farm he established, was owned and operated by seven generations of the Van Vranken family, and

WHEREAS, the Van Vranken Farm was designated a Double Century Farm in 1938, in recognition of its rich contributions to our agricultural history, and

WHEREAS, Roger Des Forges has generously donated a historic marker to the Town of Clifton Park at the site of his family farm on Riverview Road, in Vischer Ferry for all to see and appreciate; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, the Town Board of Clifton Park and its Historic Preservation Commission are grateful to Roger Des Forges and thank him for his generous contribution and efforts to help document his family’s legacy and our Town’s proud history.

Town Clerk Brobston read the legal notice that was advertised in the Schenectady Gazette on April 13, 2023.

Collection System Manager Michael O’Brien explained the fees as noticed in the Public Hearing Notice are only for residents who hook-up to the system. The proposed closes a loop of homes put in by a developer driving the cost of the sewer and we have another developer who is going to pay the cost of the sewer. It’s an opportunity for residents to get into the sewer district now. Getting in later would be to go through an outside user hook up. The residents who are in the district are in favor of the proposed extension.

WHEREAS, Resolution No. 93 of 2023 called a public hearing to be held on May 1, 2023, to hear all persons interested in this matter and to take action as required by law, and

WHEREAS, the Resolution was published and posted as required by law, and

WHEREAS, a public hearing on the matter was held by the Town Board on May 1, 2023, and the matter was fully discussed, and all interested persons were heard;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT, that the Town Board of the Town of Clifton Park hereby determines that:

1. The notice of hearing was published and posted as required by law and is otherwise sufficient.
2. All the property and property owners within the proposed District are benefited thereby.
3. All the property and property owners benefited are included within the limits of the proposed District.
4. The establishment of this District is in the public interest.

IT IS FURTHER DETERMINED AND RESOLVED, that the Map, Plan and Report prepared by Lansing Engineering dated September 1, 2022, be adopted, and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Town Board hereby approves the establishment of the Clifton Sewer District No. 1, Extension No. 6, as the boundaries are set forth and as the construction of the sewer system improvements and facilities are set forth in the Map, Plan and Report, as well as the properties identified in the July 10, 2019 inventory letter, also prepared by Lansing Engineering (as attached); and be it further

RESOLVED, that this Resolution is subject to a Permissive Referendum according to Article 12-A of the New York State Town Law.

WHEREAS, all such claims were withdrawn and dismissed within a Separation Agreement dated October 17, 2022, and approved by the Town Board by a 4-1 vote in an Executive Session on that date, and

WHEREAS, the withdrawal of all such claims was reaffirmed by a separate agreement and release dated January 17, 2023, and

WHEREAS, Selective Insurance, through its third-party administrator, Summit Risk Services, has forwarded an invoice for re-imbursement of legal costs and administrative fees for the defense of the claims within the deductible limits of the Town’s relevant insurance policies, and

WHEREAS, the Town Attorney recommends that the invoice be paid as necessary costs of defending the Town on the facts of the case; now, therefore, be it
